

Aside from the stores and tenements in the block and gore mentioned, there are few buildings or manufacturing plants of great value in the area of the park as now planned. The most valuable is the chocolate and rock candy factory of J. H. Barker & Co., in North Twelfth-st., near Bedford-ave. It is a modern four story brick factory building covering, with the adjoining sheds, about a fourth of the block. The next establishment in point of value is that of J. H. McCafferty, manufacturer of lead paints and colors, but the buildings are nearly all cheap wooden structures. The Taylor & Co. foundry, at North Twelfth-st. and Union-ave., is large, but consists of wooden buildings of little value. The brick factory of Marks, Lissberger & Co., sheeting manufacturers and refiners, is not large or in such a condition of repair as to render it peculiarly valuable. It is in Driggs-ave., and directly opposite is the Rutherford & Barnes soap factory, a series of cheap wooden buildings. The other enterprises on the ground are C. A. Friberg's foundry, the shop of George W. Hand, stairbuilder; the yard of George W. Wanzer, dealer in second hand cooperage; the shop of L. H. Carr, maker of mattresses and bedding, and those of Daniel J. Rahlly, horseshoer, and Habersham Brothers, wagonmakers, all of which occupy cheap wooden buildings.
